


#### Welcome...

# **Neighbourhood Plan Update**

Neighbourhood Plan The results of the neighbourhood survey have been compiled by Ian Poole the consultant. We have also received the design guidelines from AECOM. In the light of this, Paul Bendall, Geoffrey Bourne, Larry O'hara and I have reviewed the survey results, and the Drinkstone neighbourhood plan report, in order to define the outline of the Brettenham neighbourhood plan.

The main sections are: introduction, defining characteristics of Brettenham including the history, current issues, planning policy context, vision and objectives, spatial strategy, housing, natural environment, built environment and design, infrastructure and services.

We have agreed the allocation of sections of the Brettenham neighbourhood plan amongst us and we will develop a draft for discussion and review. The development of the draft neighbourhood plan will take into account the residents' survey results. It will also incorporate the design guidelines. Paul, Geoffrey and Larry will work with their respective neighbourhood plan working groups.

A drop-in session will be held in January 2022 in the village hall for residents to review progress to date and make comments. Date to be announced.

Hi all,

It was terrific to see such a great turnout at the October Friday Village Inn, with the village hall being pretty much full, aided undoubtedly by The Mobile Pizza Co. being in attendance. Clint and his daughter did an amazing job of cooking and serving about 60 pizzas in two and a half hours. Such a high turnout was obviously good news from a bar takings point of view as well, with our income over the last 18 months or so having been so decimated. Clint has already indicated that he would be happy to come back for another Village Inn...so we have already booked him again for Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> December, so make a note in your diaries.

Because the October Village Inn proved a successful trial, we wanted to try to secure the services of another food provider for the November Village Inn but we struggled to find someone at relatively short notice; and on Bonfire Night too! However, I'm delighted that Greg 'The Fixer' Potter has come up trumps and has arranged for 'Wagyu Gourmet Burgers & Street Food' to be with us on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> November A few people (including Em and I) have sampled their fare previously, and the burgers come highly recommended. Five years ago, in a church in Normandy an elderly priest, Jacques Hamel, was killed by terrorists while saying mass. Christians are killed for their faith every day around the world, but this was the first time it had happened in Western Europe in recent memory.

On 15th October 2021, a Christian was killed in a Church in this country, no more than 50 miles away from our Suffolk villages. Not a priest, but a devout Roman Catholic member of parliament, in a Methodist Church in Southend for a surgery with his constituents. Conservative MP Sir David Amess was stabbed multiple times in what is at the time of writing being described as a terrorist incident, though more details may well emerge later. I've made the link with Jacques Hamel, but of course not far from our minds is the murder of Labour MP Jo Cox also 5 years ago, in a terrorist attack, on her way to do exactly the same thing: meet with the public she represented.

When Jo Cox was killed much was made about the rhetoric, particularly around the Brexit campaign, which some felt fuelled hatred and in some way contributed to the white supremacist views held by her murderer. I hope there is similar reflection by those who would call conservative members "scum" or even worse. This hateful and divisive language that can be found in our political conversation is a deep part of the problem with our country, and tells the world that you are not allowed to love those with whom you disagree.

Paula Sherriff, a former Labour MP, told how David had been a fond friend to her in Parliament, despite their diametrically opposing views on pretty much everything, keeping in touch with her after she lost her seat and sending messages of support when she was going through challenging times. It's a shame that it's taken such a tragic death to hear stories of friendship across the divide, and to see that people can have huge respect for one another despite disagreeing in good faith.

Religion is often seen as a cause of division, and all too often it can be, but the faith in Jesus Christ transcends all political barriers, all class divisions, all the prejudices we hide behind for protection from those different to ourselves. There are cross parliamentary Christian fellowships, Israeli-Palestinian Church groups, and great friendships between Roman Catholics and Protestants throughout the Northern Ireland peace process that formed the bedrock of the eventual agreement. Christians worship a God who transcended the chasm we had created between him and us, and died for the very people who crucified him, and who still rebel against him today.

When we talk about the peace of God, we don't just mean a state of not fighting, but of active harmony with one another, of being one people despite all of our differences, centred around the cross which takes away our hatred.

As Sir David lay dying, a priest was refused access to him to offer him spiritual comfort as the police didn't consider this important enough, and perhaps many reading this would agree with them. Many Christians died in hospitals during that first lockdown without their minister with them, and worship was seen as a non-essential gathering by government. This is to be expected as our country becomes more secular, and faith is pushed more and more to the margins. How much longer will chaplains serve in our armed forces, offering spiritual care as they did through the many armed conflicts we remember on November 11th? Will the vacuum left by Christendom be one filled with love across the divide, or division?

# The Challenges Facing Gardeners Now and In The Future (Part 5)

Across Europe creatures are on the move. Scientists have estimated that southern insect species are travelling northwards at the rate of twelve miles per year, with around fifteen new beetle species and over ten new moth species being recorded in the UK every year.



Brown Marmorated Shieldbug

Shieldbugs arrived in the UK around 2000. It breeds regularly, especially in the southeast where it is often found on runner beans. It's a major pest in Europe on a variety of fruit and vegetables but fortunately for us its numbers increase late in the year when the bean crop has more or less finished. The Brown Marmorated Shieldbug spread from China and Japan and is now found virtually worldwide. It arrived in the UK about three years ago in luggage, timber, and clothing from the US. It can damage over 100

recorded species of cultivated plants, and over winter in houses where it can leave a rather unpleasant odour if disturbed.

The larvae of the Oak Processionary Moth can be very dangerous to us, as their tiny hairs can cause severe skin irritation, asthma attacks and eye damage. They were originally confined to a few sites in London, but DEFRA have now declared them a Notifiable Pest but put the onus on the landowner to destroy them. Unfortunately, this is a dangerous and expensive procedure. If they had been classed as a Public Health danger and not a tree pest, they may have been eliminated more quickly.

We've all seen Harlequin Ladybirds in our gardens. At first it was thought they were a serious threat to our native Ladybird, but early research is indicating that's not the case. Certainly, if my garden is anything to go by, I've seen far fewer Harlequin

Ladybirds in my garden than the regular one so maybe they will be able to live together in harmony after all.

The Asian Hornet has been increasing in numbers since 2016 and is a serious threat to our native bees and other pollinators. If it establishes itself, it could really upset the balance of our pollinators which play such an important in our ecosystem. Our native hornet is larger than the Asian Hornet, has a pale-yellow abdomen and reddish brown legs. The Asian Hornet has a dark abdomen and dark legs with yellow tips. If you spot one it should be reported to the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology at <a href="mailto:brc.ac.uk">brc.ac.uk</a>.

The Biological Records Centre (BRC), established in 1964, is a national focus in the UK for terrestrial and freshwater species recording. BRC works closely with the voluntary recording community, principally through support of national recording schemes and societies.




These mushrooms are edible, but give 1 in 25 people a stomach upset.

#### **Nature Notes**

By now our winter visitors should be well on their way to our shores, especially if there have been easterly winds blowing in recent weeks. Redwings number around 1,000,000 during our winters, as do Fieldfares. Both feast on berries, fruit and insects in our fields, hedges and gardens. We also get visited by thousands of European Blackbirds at this time of year, especially if the weather is severe on the continent. This can increase their numbers to well over 12,000,000. If you do intend to feed the birds in your gardens this winter don't forget to ensure you provide them with a regular supply of fresh water.

#### Top Tips:

- Switch all appliances off at the plug
- Use a washing up bowl instead of washing under a running tap
- Turn your thermostat down by one degree
- Turn off lights when not in the room
- Line-dry your clothes in the summer rather than use a tumble dryer
- Only fill a kettle with the water you need

\*Savings based on the average household and households who are on a water meter.

Doing all of these things could save you £140\* per year on your energy and water bills!

#### Did you know?

The average household carbon footprint in Brettenham is 20 tonnes  $CO_2e$  per year. You could save approximately 1 tonne  $CO_2e$  per year just by incorporating energy saving behaviours into your daily routine. That's the equivalent to driving 4,500 miles in the average petrol car or one return flight from London to New York!

Some friends came with Gus when he recced this walk on a sunny day in September but it would be lovely at any time of year.





## **Motoring Memories, Part VII**

Stuart's motoring memories are based on his childhood in the 1960s and 70s growing up in Brettenham where his Father ran a village shop and filling station. Last month there was mention of a celebrity's Rolls-Royce, this month we're back down to earth...

After working at the pubs, I then had a clerical job at Finborough Hall which was the HQ of Eastern Electricity. I had a 1966 Hillman Minx by then. It had a 1725cc engine and was quite quick. The fuel gauge went down at nearly the same speed as the accelerator. One frosty morning when I was driving through Buxhall, I approached a

corner too fast and touched the brakes only to find myself facing in the opposite direction. It happened so fast and was frightening. I have been to a couple of skid pans in recent years which apart from being great fun also instils some skills to hopefully avoid the skid I experienced. I certainly needed a strong coffee on arrival at work.

I then purchased a Triumph 1300 from Fordham's of Ixworth. This was a comfortable car with good visibility and the controls well placed within easy

reach. It was also very economical after the Hillman.

Before too long I was keen to get something more sporty, and acquired the Fiat Mirafiori 131. This was a standard saloon but had very accurate handling and felt very sporty. On one occasion just outside of Bury St Edmunds I was waved down by the police. They asked me what the speed limit was. I replied "30mph". Their next

question was "what was your speed?" I replied perhaps a little over the limit. They informed me that it was 42mph and were interested in the reason for this. I informed them that I had just collected the car from being serviced and that the performance must have improved beyond recognition. The officer grinned and suggested I move on with the second word of guidance being "off". Discretion without electronics, sadly now with so few traffic officers a thing of the past.

Other than the two Daihatsu Charade Gttis, I had a number of other Daihatsus. The first was a 3 door Charade with a 1 litre engine followed by the Turbo model. The company also produced a 4-door saloon, the Charmant. It was quite conventional but compared to British cars of the same era was well equipped with fully adjustable seats, a sunroof and a radio cassette player. Being part of the Toyota group, Daihatsu were built to a high standard and the quality assurance guaranteed. The local dealers were usually small and offered a really personal service. After 34 years the former owner of the garage recalls the cars I bought from him.

During my ownership of one of the cars, I was passing a garage in Kettering which was offering free window etching with each window being etched with the car registration. This was quite a security benefit, so I went into the garage to make enquires. They assured me it was free. They took details of the registration, came outside to check it and gave me a copy of the invoice advising me to come back in an hour. On my return the car was standing outside and on my way in to collect the keys I was shocked to see that the incorrect registration had been etched on all of the windows. I asked to speak with the manager who apologised and stated they would pay to have all the glass changed which was the only solution. I asked for this to be put in writing. He replied that his Secretary was not working and therefore it was not possible. I suggested that as he was the Manager I assumed he could write and that a handwritten and signed document would suffice. The garage did pay to have all the windows replaced. They had to be shipped from Japan and it took a couple of months before they arrived. After this I was convinced that etching was a good deterrent as any thief worthy of the title would not risk the possibility of having to replace the glass to avoid detection. These days on most cars I believe the vehicle identification number is etched into the windscreen and etching each individual window does not seem to be used nowadays.

# **Easy-Peasy Christmas Cake**

If you've never made a Christmas Cake and want to give it a go, this is the recipe for you! I have made it countless times and it has never gone wrong and never failed to impress. It keeps well so best made 3 or 4 weeks in advance to let the flavours develop. You can always add rum to keep it longer!

440g can crushed pineapple in syrup

1kg mixed dried fruit
250g butter, chopped
200g soft brown sugar
2 tbsp orange marmalade
2 tbsp dark rum
4 large eggs, lightly beaten
250g plain flour
50g self-raising flour
1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tbsp extra dark rum



- Drain pineapple over jug; discard 125ml of syrup.
- Combine pineapple, remaining syrup, fruit, butter, sugar, marmalade and rum in large saucepan. Stir over gentle heat until butter melts and sugar dissolves; bring to boil. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, for 10 minutes. Cool to room temperature.
- Preheat oven to 150C/gas mark 2. Use three sheets of greaseproof paper to line base and sides of deep 20cm round cake tin, bringing paper up 5cm above edge of tin.
- Stir eggs and sifted dry ingredients into fruit mixture. Pour mixture into prepared tin.
- Bake for 1 1/2 2 hours. Cover top with tin foil if it starts to brown too much. Test cake with skewer after 1 1/2 hours, if skewer comes out clean it is cooked. If not, put back in oven and check again later.
- When cooked, brush while hot with extra rum. Cover tightly with tin foil; cool cake in tin. Decorate as desired.

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
