

Recipe

Leek and Bacon Pithivier

A pithivier is a round pie made by baking two disks of puff pastry together, it has a filling stuffed in between. It is traditionally decorated with spiral lines drawn from the top outwards with the point of a knife and scalloping on the edge.

Ingredients

2 large red onions

2 leeks

6 rashers of bacon

40g butter

3 tbsp flour

250ml milk

100g cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper to season

Optional extras (small bag of spinach, chopped mushrooms

Two packets of pre made puff pastry

1 egg beaten (to glaze)

Method

Chop up the onions, leeks and bacon and gently fry in the butter in a large frying pan. When cooked remove from the heat and add the flour, salt and pepper.

Stir in a little of the milk. Return to a very low heat and gradually add the remainder of the milk .

This should thicken to make a creamy sauce. Add the optional extras (or not).

Add the grated cheese and leave to cool.

Roll out the pastry into two circles. Place one circle on a grease proved baking tray. Spoon on the cooled mixture. Place the second circle of pastry on top of the mixture pressing down the edge to seal the circle. Pop a hole in the top and brush with the beaten egg mixture.

These can be a size to suit. You can either make a large single Pithivier or individual small ones. Round or square.

Bake in the oven Gas mark 4, 180C for approx. 35-40mins or until golden brown.

One to freeze and one to cook.

A Rural Education Part 4

Stuart concludes his memories of Rattlesden Primary School.

In my class there were identical twins, Peter and Paul Seymour. They often created a bit of havoc by confusing people as to which was Peter and which was Paul. On occasions Mr Northeast would ask the class to assist him in identifying which was which and this turned into something of a habit, probably a useful diversion away from test of spelling and arithmetic. I believe that Paul Seymour joined the police force and may have been based in Bury St Edmunds. One of the annual events was Sports Day and this was held on the playing field of the school. There would be the competitive running races but also such things as the three legged race and the egg and spoon race.

A daily event at school was the morning milk at break time. In each class students were selected to be milk monitors which required the delivery and collection of the milk crates with the small bottles of milk (1/3 pint or

200mls) to the classroom. The provision of free milk had been encompassed in the Education Act of 1944 and was eventually discontinued by the then Education Secretary Margaret Thatcher in the early 1970s. This brought about a public outcry. Apart from the academic staff there are other staff essential to ensure the smooth running of the school. Mrs Nunn was the School Secretary, she would collect the dinner money and was responsible for the



administration. Her husband was a local builder and lived at High Town Green. Another important staff member at the school was Mrs O'Brian, she was the caretaker.

On a weekly basis the local Church of England vicar Revd. Brian Thompson would come into the school to conduct an assembly and in later years the local Baptist pastor, John Skull, would also hold an assembly. He would also take the religious education class. Having looked at the website of the school the thing which struck me was the amount of equipment which is in the classrooms and also how bright and colourful everything looks. I noticed that there seems to have been lots of developments around the

main buildings with additional blocks and other outside structures. Something I did notice was that the parquet floor is still in the main hall, I wonder if the smell of furniture polish and disinfectant is still evident? Compared to 1963 there does not seem to be many open areas such as the playing field. Getting to school was on the school bus. Squirrels of Hitcham provided the transport towards my last few years at Rattlesden. Squirrels Coaches was set up by two brother Philip and Mick Squirrel and as well as coaches they also did removals. On one occasion they used a furniture lorry to transport us to school, great fun. Not sure what "health and safety" would make of that. Squirrels remain an active company and are still family owned. A local Brettenham resident Bert Ward drove for Squirrels for many years and probably transported up to three generations of some families to school. It seems guite common that former armed services personnel went on to become teachers, certainly at Beyton Secondary Modern school there were a good number who had a military background. After the second World War there was a recruitment drive to attract teachers under a post war emergency scheme consisting of one year training followed by a two year probationary period. This was a successful scheme as some 5000 candidates a month were applying in 1945 and the difficulty was to find suitable buildings for training colleges. Beyton Secondary Modern school opened in 1953. Next time I will share memories of secondary school life.

Rambling with Gus

Rambling with Gus at Rattlesden
Approx 3.16 miles. Approx 1 hour 10 minutes

Gus and I did this ramble in the autumn when the hedgerows were full of blackberries, but it is a good walk to do at any time of year as it follows grassy paths and quiet country roads so not too muddy.

The walk starts near the war memorial at High Town Green on the road from Brettenham to Rattlesden. With the war memorial on your left,



you take the country lane just next to it. The lane soon turns into a farm track and then into a footpath. From here, there is a warren of paths you can take. My version is to go straight across the fields to Mitchery Lane and then turn left towards Rattlesden. Follow the road until you come to a junction with a road "Baby Lane" coming in from the left. Take the footpath on the left at this junction then follow a circuit of paths that leads you back to Baby Lane. Turn right and go a short distance along the road before taking the footpath on your left. This takes you past King's Wood



which was planted in 2006/7 and is now maturing nicely. Once past the wood, carry straight on along the path that re-joins the path you started on near the memorial.
