If you don't have access to the internet, paper copies of the Plan will be available to borrow for a short period from Nick Tavener (01449 736412) or myself, we will also have a supply of paper forms available if you wish to submit comments.

Volunteer required – Internal Auditor – if anyone is interested in helping out the Parish Council in carrying out the internal audit on the Council accounts (commencing 2025) please contact Della, our Parish Clerk, who will explain what is involved.

Litter in the village — Parish Councillors undergo an annual litter pick around the village about this time of year before the foliage comes to life again. We are very much assisted by residents - some of whom carry it out regularly and most we know who pick up what they see in their travels if they are suitably equipped. I think you would all agree that we live in a particularly beautiful part of Suffolk and the village is well tended by residents, landowners and the Gardening Club so the smallest amounts of litter can be a blight. Thank you to all those that contribute so much time and energy to keeping Brettenham beautiful and let's hope to see a litter free village in the coming year.

Flooding in the village — progress has been made on the flooding issue at the bottom of Chapel Hill on the small piece of green housing the old Coronation Oak, the early investigation work carried out by Peter Truin, Andrew Gooderham and Nick Tavener and some robust intervention by the neighbouring landowner seems to have seen a definite improvement in the water draining away more effectively. The wet weather is not over yet and time will tell but so far the results have been quite dramatic. Many thanks to all involved in getting to grips dealing with this.

The next Parish Council Meeting is Thursday 11 April. This will be preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting - a public meeting where you will be free to ask questions and raise any issues - more details in the April magazine.

Finally a reminder that Della does circulate reports, agendas and minutes for the Parish Council. If you would like to be added to the circulation email for these please contact her and let her know.

Taking a school assembly is always a bit of a challenge, especially if you are new to the school and relatively inexperienced. There is often a theme to the assembly and it needs to have a



purpose and be engaging for the pupils. In some schools the staff also attend and in others you are left to your own devices. One of my earliest experiences involved a school hall full of 11-14 year olds minus any other teachers. I arrived in the hall several minutes before the pupils to get things ready and ensure I was well prepared. I was met by a couple of burly workmen who were repairing a section of the wooden stage. I asked them if they'd like to take a short break for 15 minutes or so and get themselves a tea or coffee.

"Na mate, we ain't got the time. We've got six other jobs to finish before free O'clock today" Obviously I should have insisted, but I didn't. The two chaps climbed onto the stage, pulled the curtain behind them and got on with things quietly. "At least they've got the sense to do that" I thought to myself. The pupils filed in and after a few minutes I was able to begin the assembly. Everything went smoothly for the first 5 minutes or so until from behind the curtain came the sound of pieces of wood being sawn and then falling to the ground. This continued for 5 or 6 minutes during which time the giggling and chattering from the floor gradually increased. Needless to say the assembly ended rather chaotically and the message to the pupils was completely lost.

Rector's Reflection

When my children were small, they used to love an Easter egg hunt. Equipped with a basket each, they'd scurry around the garden, (with strict instructions to share!), uncovering the shiny treasures I'd hidden, and whooping with delight at regular intervals.

We had some other traditions too, some of which still play a part in our family Easter. There's the Easter tree – bare branches picked up on a muddy dog walk and stuck into a pot of earth. They stayed bare until after dark on Easter Eve – and then we'd festoon the branches with yellow, green, gold and pink ribbons and tiny decorated eggs. Making spicy Easter biscuits, to remind us of the women with their spices, visiting Jesus' tomb early in the morning of that first Easter. And the Easter garden – a plastic tray filled with soil and small flowering plants, a tomb made from pebbles and a cross fashioned from twigs.

Like the foil-wrapped eggs on our garden hunt, there are so many treasures to be found in the Easter story.

The friends of Jesus, having shared a meal together on Thursday evening, then faced the brutal reality of power and cruelty on Friday. Their master and teacher arrested, tried and dead within 24 hours. They were bewildered and lost on Saturday, waiting, unsure. And then the disbelief turning to puzzlement and finally joy on Sunday, as they grappled with a new reality – their friend, their leader, their inspiration, restored to them. How many whoops of delight did they utter I wonder?!

We know we don't live in a Pollyanna world – too many of us have seen or experienced things that are harsh, unfair, even downright cruel. We've lost friends or loved ones. We've been bewildered and lost, maybe trapped in repeating patterns, fearful of the future and feeling very alone. Sometimes we may feel as if we're waiting and waiting for things to improve, and the winter seems to be never ending. Dry twigs, bare branches, stuck in a pot of mud.

But the story of Easter urges us to keep looking. Keep hunting for the glimpse of colour and light in the long grass or in the shadows. Keep looking for dawn on the horizon. Keep an eye out for the bursting buds, be alert for that lovely scent on

the breeze. Easter promises us that even the worst the world can do is not the end of the story. There is always hope to be found, often in ways we can't begin to imagine. Life and love, new possibility, a new beginning – just make sure you share!

Nature Notes

It has been very mild so far this February and I have noticed a significant change in the behaviour of some of our bird species. The skylarks have been singing loudly as they gain height almost vertically from the ground in the field behind the old chapel. They are unusual in that they sing while in flight. At this time of year

it tends to be the males that rise to great heights, singing loudly in the hope of attracting a mate. Since the new year I have made a conscious effort to record the birds I have seen in, and flying above, our garden. On most days I have seen between 10 and 13 different species of birds.

To my surprise the one that has caught my attention the most has been the Robins. Their red breasts are really bright this time of year and on several occasions I have seen 3 or 4 in close proximity to one another. At this time of year they are fiercely territorial and they are not afraid to fly straight at other robins in an effort to stake their claim for their own territory. Once they have claimed their own territory they sing for long periods to tell other robins to keep away. Like most species of small birds, Robins are very susceptible to cold winters, when they can rapidly loose a lot of body weight and succumb to the freezing temperatures. Our mild winter so far is one reason why I have had several robins in my garden at the same time. If you want to attract or keep Robins in your garden put out mealworms for them. They love them. Just as a side note. How many Christmas cards did you receive with a Robin on the cover? Four or five maybe. This tradition goes back to the Victorian era when sending Christmas cards became a popular thing to do. During that time the posties wore red coats and were nicknamed Robins.

Recipe - Roasted Vegetable Lasagne

This is a vegetarian lasagne with a smoky Mediterranean flavor. It freezes well and can be made in advance, so perfect for family occasions.

Ingredients: For the vegetable mixture -

2 large packs (at least 500g) of cherry tomatoes, de-skinned if possible

1 Aubergine & **3 courgettes** (covered with salt, weighed down in a colander for 1 hour, rinsed and then patted dry)

1 red and 1 yellow pepper, deseeded and cut into quite large chunks

1t o 2 red onions, peeled and cut into rough chunks

3-4 cloves garlic, chopped

Also-

Bunch **Basil** leaves, 75g (3oz) pitted **black olives**, 1 heaped tablespoon **capers**, **drained**,150g (6oz) **Mozarella cheese** -grated, 100g **Parmesan**,-grated, approx 12 **Lasagne** sheets, **bay leaf**, **nutmeg**, 3-4 tbsp **olive or rapeseed oil**, **salt and pepper**

Place the vegetables, and some of the basil in a baking tray, then drizzle olive or rapeseed oil over and toss. Season and then roast high on gas mark 9 (240 C) until the edges of the rough cut vegetables are toasted brown, which is 35-40 mins. When the mix has cooked, add sliced black olives, the capers and more torn basil.

Meanwhile make up about approx. 750ml (1 and a half pints) of white sauce cooked with a bay leaf and nutmeg for flavour and add grated parmesan cheese (about 5 tablespoons) to turn it into a cheese sauce. Layer a standard lasagne tin with the cheese sauce then the roasted vegetable mixture, mozzarella and lasagne sheets, in that order. Do this again, finishing with a layer of sauce then grate parmesan cheese on top. Bake for approximately 30 mins at the lower temperature of gas mark 4 (180 C) until the top is golden. Serves 4-6





Rambling with Gus from Hitcham to Wattisham and back

This is a circular walk that starts and finishes near Hitcham Church.

Distance 3.30 miles. Time approx. 1 hour 15 minutes.

Park by the triangular green at the entrance to the church. On foot, go through the church gates then cut right across the church yard to take the lane coming in from the right.

At the end of the lane turn left onto Fen Road which has a gentle incline. It is a dead-end road. At the top

of Fen Road, where the road bends sharply to the right take the foot path to the right of Gypsy Hall. There is a signpost for Clay Hill Lane. You need to cross the stream after which it is important to keep the hedge on your right.

After approx. ½ mile, the footpath becomes a farm track and then a road with a few houses. Eventually, at a T junction, it meets the road which goes from Bildeston to Wattisham. There are a couple of houses at the junction and the Wattisham Stone. Legend has it that the stone turns around on the spot when the chimes can be heard from the clock tower in Bildeston market place – disappointingly this did not happen when I was passing.


Turn left onto the Bildeston to Wattisham road. Walk as far as Baytree Farm on your right then take the footpath on your left. The sign was in the ditch when I walked it so keep your eyes peeled. The path now follows the boundary of Devil's Wood. A local I met on the walk told me that the wood got its name as it was a burial site during one of the plagues centuries ago. The woods are now used for raising game birds so dogs need to be kept under close control.

Follow the footpath down to a bridge across the stream then take the path to the left and skirt around the lake. Continue on this path until you come to a meadow that is fenced in. DO NOT go into the meadow as I did, instead at the gate turn right and keep the fence on your left as you follow the fence around the edge of the field onto a well-defined path with a stream on your right. Now follow this path all the way along the field edge back to

Gypsy Hall where you regain Fen Road to return to the Church. The church is certainly worth a look. Indirectly, it has historical connections with Charles Darwin. You will have to call in to find our more...

There are no pubs in Hitcham but the Post Office does serve tea and coffee and has a selection of freshly made cakes. But if it is a pint you're looking for, The Crown at Bildeston is close by.

Having had rather a lot of rain recently, the second verse of this poem is all too familiar a scene! I do hope we will have more of the weather in the first verse for March.


This is the weather the cuckoo likes,

And so do I.


This is the weather the shepherd shuns,


